


HONORARY LIFE FELLOW OF ISCB-2010



Robert Howard Grubbs (born February 27, 1942 Possum Trot, Kentucky) is an American [chemist](#) and [Nobel laureate](#). Grubbs's many awards have included: Alfred P. Sloan Fellow (1974–76), Camille and Henry Dreyfus Teacher-Scholar Award (1975–78), [Alexander von Humboldt](#) Fellowship (1975), ACS [Benjamin Franklin Medal](#) in Chemistry (2000), ACS Herman F. Mark Polymer Chemistry Award (2000), ACS Herbert C. Brown Award for Creative Research in Synthetic Methods (2001), the Tolman Medal (2002), and the [Nobel Prize in Chemistry](#) (2005). He was elected to the [National Academy of Sciences](#) in 1989 and a fellowship in the [American Academy of Arts and Sciences](#) in 1994.

Grubbs received the 2005 [Nobel Prize in Chemistry](#), along with [Richard R. Schrock](#) and [Yves Chauvin](#), for his work in the field of [olefin metathesis](#).

Grubbs is married to Helen Grubbs, a retired [SLP](#) elementary school teacher with three children—all of whom have earned a PhD or an M.D.
